But, a closer inspection of the description and specs reveals that this thing not only looks like an illigitimate Elektron offspring, but it actually might intentionally be by design... and, it's polyphonic...

Powerful program parameters

RADIAS? effect section provides a two-band EQ and two insert effects for each timbre, plus a master effect for the complete program, delivering a total of nine possible simultaneous effects. Thirty effect algorithms are provided, ranging from delay, chorus, and reverb to compressor and talking modulator. You can assign any effect parameter to the front panel knobs for instant control, providing even more versatility in sound design.

Arpeggiator settings can be made for each program individually, and the arpeggiator can be applied to any or all of the timbres in a program. Six types of arpeggiator patterns are provided. Patterns can be up to 32 steps long; the gate time, velocity, and on/off status can be set for each step individually to create the exact groove you want. Swing amount and octave range are also assignable for even more detailed control.

Two step sequencers can record and play back performance data, each with up to 32 steps. By applying a step sequencer to a drum kit, you can use RADIAS as a programmable drum machine. Each step supports up to eight notes of polyphony, allowing the creation of dense sequenced passages and patterns that can be played back with just one finger. With sequence editing, you can adjust settings such as swing and gate time. The two step sequencers can be set to transpose live from the keyboard, and can also be linked to create a single step sequencer of up to 64 steps.

It's true that if you compare prices and specs, the Virus Ti looks like a better buy. But I already have a Virus B, and more important to me is the user interface and realtime interactivity. The Radius looks like it will have similar sequencing as the EMX. Despite its brittle and harsh sound, the EMX for me ends up being a go-to box for wierd synth noises and basic percussion, simply because it's so easy to get up and going on it so quickly. If the Radius has the same ease of use, and if the oscillator quality and filter smoothness is improved from the MS2000, I would consider it.

The Spectralis analog synth section is monophonic, which limits its appeal to me. The rest of the voices are standard sample-playback like other existing hardware samplers.

Is a mono analog synth, sample-playback engine, and a sequencer in one box worth \$2,500? Not to me. I've already invested more than enough money and energy on gear that can do the same things.

Last year, there were a few threads over at Harmony-Central.com and a magazine review that revealed the Spectralis OS was in an unfinished state, even though people had already purchased it. More disappointing was that many of the advertised features were not yet implemented. Also, it sounded like the OS was not very easy or straightforward to navigate, and was heavily dependent on menus... Finally, there were many undocumented parameters, cryptic abbreviations, etc.

While the Spectralis is deep and has some cool sound capabilities and features, I ultimately decided it wouldn't be worth it for me.

Spectralis. I bought one from analogue haven's first shipment. Hybrid synth sounds great. Really, really good. The analog filters rule. Very high quality piece like Elektron's gear.

It was SO unfinished I sold it. Couldn't even save individual patches at the time. Sample import is clumsy and no mac support (still a year later...). The interface is heavily menu driven, very similar to quasimidi stuff (raven, sirius). I check their forum periodically. Still quite unfinished though a ton of features have been introduced. Still no sampling, analog sequencer is still limited and not assignable as planned, etc.

Joerg Schaaf is incredible with support, hope they can finish it completely. Then it will be worth the money.

A couple of year ago we were scanning around looking for possible partners. We had some discussions with Korg, and I visited them in their HW in Japan. It turned out they were mostly interested in hiring us as external engineering power which wasn't interesting.

However, we were very open in these discussions (when the Monomachine was not yet released), and I don't think they are very shy about "borrowing ideas". The EMX that was released some months later had a "chord"-synthesis, which to me looked quite inspired by the "ensemble" of the Mono. :) That Unison synth by description might draw some other Mono-synth to mind as well with a little imagination. Fortunately it's not all about specifications though, but implementation.

Not that it bothers me, it's more honoring, but I know from sources they study our stuff to the bone, and it's honoring that the slim form factor of the Mono keyboard maybe has had an impact on another synthesizer! And I'm not surprised it's Korg. Whom I must say in my eyes develops the most interesting stuff in the mainstream area. Haven't tried the Radias though, but looks more interesting than the I-Want-To-Be-A-Computer-Oasys monster anyhow (plump in the record).

Regarding Korg, I am not surprised that they "migrated" your ideas to their product line. That proves who is the innovator

In fact, the main reason I bought the EMX and ESX was because of how closely they reminded me of the MD. Those products do implement a few ideas from your products on a superficial level, but they fall far short in key areas - depth and quality of sounds, and the user interface.

Fortunately I don't get into that end of things, but I've seen and heard some shocking things.
